- 1 Existing burials to remain and be protected, with shade tree planting where practical
- 2 Existing internal roadway to remain and be protected. This finish is understood to be rolled and seeded asphalt.
- 3 Proposed new pathway to replicate past (historical) location of pavement where possible. Pathway finish to match adjacent compacted gravel pathways.
- 4 Consider a paved threshold and improved drainage at the intersection of new and existing pavements to reduce slips, trips, and falls and identify the precinct point of arrival.
- 5 Perimeter pathway treatment with re-aligned headstones located close to known denominations. The layout and size of the headstones are indicative, and represent the number per denominational area and their location along the perimeter of the 1850's cemetery.
- 6 Proposed shade street planting to border the 1850's cemetery area
- 7 Existing turf to be maintained with existing headstones or memorials within the 1850's cemetery to remain and be protected.
- 8 Existing relocated memorial headstone area
- 9 Proposed new gate and arrival signage to providing a visual arrival threshold into the Cemetery via Briggs Road
- 10 Additional feature shade tree planting to provide to frame the vista into the cemetery when viewed from the intersection of Briggs and Cemetery Road(s)
- 11 Paved seating area overlooking the 1850's cemetery. This threshold is proposed to include shade tree planting, opportunities for interpretative signage and seating
- 12 A known Aboriginal burial area. This location within the cemetery is proposed to be supplemented with opportunities for indigenous planting to create a contemplative and engaging setting. Opportunities for interpretative artwork are to be developed by Traditional Owners where appropriate.
- 13 Potential location of future internment opportunities
- 14 Feature pavement zone demarcates the known religious denominational boundaries. Consider interpretative signage to complement this pavement alignment.
